# **About the SH 16 (Bandera Road) Project**

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is working closely with officials from the cities of Leon Valley and San Antonio to study potential improvements along SH 16 (Bandera Road) between I-410 and Loop 1604.

This 6.5-mile stretch of road is the 8th most congested road in the region and one of the top 100 most congested in the State of Texas.

The SH 16 (Bandera Road) Project involves the collection of data to analyze existing project corridor issues, coordination with project stakeholders and the public, the consideration of potential roadway improvements including bicycle and pedestrian accommodations, as well as the preparation of environmental studies.

The proposed improvements will ultimately be based on traffic, local and regional access needs, safety, the avoidance and minimization of environmental impacts, and the consideration of community input.

To help inform proposed improvements, TxDOT is working with Leon Valley, San Antonio, Bexar County, various agencies, elected officials, community representatives and key stakeholders. The public will also have numerous opportunities to get involved including an upcoming public meeting and other engagement events.

# TxDOT, City of San Antonio, City of Leon Valley: Who's Doing What?



SH 16 (also known as Bandera Road), is a state highway that passes through the cities of San Antonio and Leon Valley. While TxDOT initiated and is sponsoring this project, the City of San Antonio has a concurrent Bandera Road Corridor Plan underway.

TxDOT's focus is on improving the transportation system; the City of San Antonio is focused on economic development, land use, recommendations related to the design of multimodal improvements, and sustainability interventions along the section of SH 16 (Bandera Road) located within San Antonio. Leon Valley is interested in serving its residents through enhancing Leon Valley's growth and development along the segment of SH 16 (Bandera Road) within its boundaries.

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# What is a Feasibility Study?

TxDOT's SH 16 (Bandera Road) Project is currently in the "feasibility" phase of the overall project development process.

During this phase, you won't see bulldozers, road closures, or construction workers. Instead, engineers and planners will define the problems, gather data, and recommend solutions to best meet the challenges of traffic congestion, mobility, and safety along the roadway.

The feasibility study process considers the benefits and costs of each potential concept, effectiveness of implementation, potential environmental impacts, and other factors. The engineers and planners, with input from community members, will summarize the issues and analyze a preferred concept.

After a preferred concept is identified in late 2020, the engineers will begin schematic design and environmental studies of the preferred concept.

What about bicycles and pedestrians?

In addition to vehicles, TxDOT's project will include proposed improvements for pedestrians and bicyclists.

# Traffic, Traffic and More Traffic!

SH 16 (Bandera Road), from its humble beginnings as a two-lane, rural roadway (1920s), now carries up to 70,000+ vehicles on up to six lanes daily and has around four traffic signals per mile. To put this into perspective, SH 151, near the SH 16 (Bandera Road) and I-410 intersection, is a four-lane urban highway with 70,000+ vehicles per day. On SH 151, frontage roads are provided for access to driveways and local streets, and the highway is grade separated at cross streets (bridges are provided).

# Let's Compare the Numbers

TxDOT together with their study partners, the cities of San Antonio and Leon Valley, conducted an online survey from February to May 2019 to collect community input on the SH 16 (Bandera Road) Project, including priorities for the corridor, travelers' primary reason for using the roadway, and desired design features.

# Did you know?

Nearly three-quarters of the respondents use SH 16 (Bandera Road) for shopping or errands.

Around half travel on the corridor to either commute to and from home or work.

Why not synchronize the traffic lights instead of worrying about a bigger kind of project?

Traffic signals have already been synchronized. The current traffic, more than 70,000 cars traveling on SH 16 (Bandera Road) every day, has exceeded the capacity of signal synchronization.

TxDOT, the City of San Antonio, and the City of Leon Valley have joined forces to share corridor information and provide a myriad of opportunities for the public to participate in the project development process and share input.
